SELF-SERVICE TECHNOLOGY PART OF SIGNIFICANT OVERHAUL

SELF-serve check-outs are coming to Brighton Library as part of a \$220,000 upgrade.

Residents will borrow and return items by scanning them once the library reopens mid-November.

The upgrade also includes new carpets, paint and airconditioning.

Holdfast Bay Mayor Ste-

phen Patterson said surveys showed staff and library users wanted the Jetty Rd building upgraded.

"While we love our library the carpet is wearing thin, the air-conditioning needs replacing and the walls need a fresh coat of paint," Mr Patterson said.

He said no library staff would lose their jobs in favour of self-serve technology. "The self-service technology will effectively free up valuable staff time so they can offer more one-onone assistance, and work on maintaining and improving the library's collection and range of services," he said.
